St Kilda Film Festival

Laughter and applause filled the Yarroweyah Town Hall when the St Kilda Film Festival travelled to our Shire in June. The films were very entertaining and catered for all. Most films had a comical edge to them, however some films were educational, whilst others celebrated the cultural diversity of Australia. One film titled the "Fabric" about Katrina, a teenager whose family have taken refuge in the country town of Shepparton from war torn Sudan, is seeking a way out. A chance meeting with teenage boy Charlie shows her the town in a new light. The Fabric was developed with Sudanese teens from Shepparton. They shared raw and intimate stories of their experiences fleeing a war-torn country and growing up in an Australian country town.

Over 100 people attended and enjoyed the delightful supper provided by the Town Hall Committee and a glass of Monichino's wine to top it off.

Feedback from the night was very positive with requests to bring the festival back next year. Thank you to all that supported the event.

In The Bin Short Film Workshop toured our Shire in August, producing some fantastic results.

Over 80 students took part in the workshop with 16 short films completed.

Students from Nathalia, Numurkah and Cobram Secondary College's along with Sacred Heart

College Yarrawonga and Nathalia's St Mary's of the Angels took part in the 3 day workshop.

On day one, the students were introduced to the program through a fun half day workshop where Jed

Cahill the facilitator had the student's attention from the start.

The students enjoyed learning how to use the special effects program to create alternative scenes. First Jed would record the students performing a casual skit then swap their words around using the editing feature, with one scene appearing as though a flame ball had been thrown and another student saying he loved a girl... the student's roared laughing and were inspired to get out and start filming.

On day two, the students were divided into groups and began working on script ideas. It was interesting to see the topics students wanted chose as many were Hollywood style films and included aliens, or wizards, bank robberies and even stalkers.

The footage for the films was mainly taken in the school grounds however some had permission to film in different locations including the old Yarrawonga Convent. This was a great place to film as it's rumoured to be haunted, however no ghosts were seen.

On day three the students got to see one of the industry's modern tools of the trade when Jed showed the students how to capture film using a capture copter and filmed the Yarrawonga area from the sky, nearly all the kids jumped on the internet to see how to buy one, it was obviously a highlight of the program. Later that day the students experienced what real film making would feel like having to record a scene up to ten times to get the right angle, working tirelessly to get their films done the students collected enough footage to finally edit and add their special effects.

Jed showed the students how to edit their footage and add their subtitles. Family and friends enjoyed a screening of the films at the conclusion of the workshop. Many of the students were proud of their achievement and all enjoyed the experience. Special thanks to Jed Cahill from In the Bin for sharing his knowledge with our future film makers. Also thank you to all the teachers and schools for accepting our invitation of being involved. We were lucky enough to show the student's films to His Excellency the Honourable Alex Chernov AC QC and Mrs Chernov when they toured Moira Shire last week.

Numurkah Lake School of Celtic Music Song & Dance

Moira Arts and Culture Inc is hosting the inaugural Numurkah Lake School of Celtic Music Song and Dance. The event starts on Thursday 2 October and finishes on Sunday 5 October 2014.

Workshops are on offer: Fiddle, mandolin, uillean pipes, guitar, ukulele, whistle, bodhran, DADGAD guitar, guitar basics, poetry and dance.

The lake School first held in April 2000, was styled on the famous Willie Clancy Week in County Clare, Ireland. It was created by Felix and Christine Meagher and Val Kennedy who wanted to see an Australian Celtic Music School formed that their children could go to. The first Lake School had thirty enrolled students and eight tutors. The event has grown to host more than a hundred lessons, sessions, concerts and ceilidhes in the week and in 2013 there were 1697 enrolled students and over 20 tutors.

Moira Arts and Culture Inc (MAC INC) identified through Moira Shires Strategic Community Plan the need to develop arts and cultural programs within the Shire. The Board was looking for a major event that would deliver communities expectations in regards to workshops and development opportunities. One of the events that MAC INC brought to Moira Shire was 'The Man They Called Banjo'. held in Picola earlier this year, the event was a huge success of which Felix Meagher and some of his tutors were the stars of.

It was from there the relationship grew as the community requested similar events to visit our towns. And Felix had a Celtic program fitting for our lovely town of Numurkah. There it be!

On the Sheep's Back



MAC INC are proud to announce we are bringing a wonderful photographic Exhibition to Yarrawonga and Nathalia called "On the Sheep's Back" The dates and venue are still being confirmed so watch this space for more information. On The Sheep's Back is a fascinating collection of 1950's photography by renowned photo journalist Francis Reiss. In the 1950's, the Australian economy 'rode on the sheep's back', with the country's prosperity largely based on wool exports. Outback sheep stations and the people who worked them came to symbolise the Australian way of life. Over the ensuring decades, there was a significant shift away from working the land, with Australia becoming increasingly urbanised.

Reiss documented this era with his photographs of Burren Burren station owner Rex White and his family. The enduring images offer a glimpse of the effort involved in running a 30,000 acre property with 5000 sheep at the height of the wool boom. His work is included in the collections of the National Portrait Gallery of Australia, the National Library of Australia, the State Library of Victoria, Heide Museum of Modern Art, the Jewish Museum and the Whitehorse Art Collection.


QUICK RESPONSE GRANTS Regional Arts Victoria
